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

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Essential lawncare tips from the pro

(NC) Now's the time to get outside and survey lawns, gardens and shrubs to see how they weathered the winter. After a long period of dormancy, plants and turf are ready to grow during what amounts to a short season for most of Canada.

To maximize the health, resiliency and growth of your plants, regular feeding is required. All plants require nitrogen, potassium and phosphorous to grow. Nitrogen boosts growth and green colour. Phosphorus feeds seedlings and stimulates new root growth. And potassium provides all around vigour and health and strengthens resistance to disease and stress.

When it comes to lawns, feeding promotes a thick, healthy turf that can fight off weeds and withstand drought conditions. Fertilizer provides nutrients in the proper amounts. Review your options at your local lawn and garden centre by reading the fertilizer bag label or by testing your soil with a home

kit or professional lawn care service.

The three numbers on the bag indicate the ratio of three key nutrients in-cluded in all fertilizers: ni-trogen, phosphorus and potassium, listed in this order. For example, if a bag reads 21-4-3 it contains 21 per cent nitrogen, 4 per cent phosphorus and 3 per cent potassium.

Know the size of your lawn and buy only what you need. Follow the instructions on the bag and remember that more is not always better. Use a good quality lawn fertilizer spreader or a handheld model to distribute fertilizer evenly.

Feed your lawn every other month beginning in the spring. A lawn fed three to four times a year develops a deep root system to resist heat, drought and wear. It also develops thick green top growth to naturally resist weeds, disease and insects. Canadian holidays are an easy way to remember best times to feed your lawn — think Easter, Victoria Day, Labour Day and Thanksgiving.

To keep fertilizer on the grass and prevent it from running off into sewers, sweep any stray granules on driveways, patios and sidewalks back onto your lawn where it can do its iob.

Essential summer home improvement tips

(NC) Last year we saw record rainfall in many parts of Canada over the warmer months. Before the first summer storm hits this year, take some time to protect your property against flooding.

Protect doors and windows. Put weather protection sealant around basement windows and the base of ground-level doors. Install flood shields or barriers for basement windows and doors, making sure the tops of the shields extend above ground level.

Safeguard water systems. Install backwater valves or plugs for drains, toilets and other sewer connections. Make sure your sump pump is working and install a battery-operated backup. in

case of a power failure.

Facilitate drainage. Water should drain away from your property and neighbouring properties. Check that your roof and eaves are draining properly in heavy rains and make sure downspouts extend at least two metres away from your basement wall.

Prepare for flooding. Raise large appliances, furnaces, hot water heaters and electrical panels up on wood or cement blocks above the potential water level. If an item can't be raised, consider anchoring it and protecting it with a floodwall or shield. Move furniture, valuables and electronics to the safest place in your

property that is least likely to be affected by flooding.

Add some greenery. Consider planting a "rain garden" by using landscaping as way to catch and disperse water in the soil near your property. Use native plants and vegetation that will resist soil erosion.

Check outdoor grading. Make sure that your lot is properly graded. If possible, build up the ground around your property so that water can drain away from basement walls.

Renegotiating your mortgage?

Some banks bundle other financial products, like car loans or credit cards, together under a readvanceable mortgage — a term mortgage combined with a home equity line of credit. This is typically offered at an attractive interest rate.

While a readvanceable mortgage has its benefits, be aware of the fees that apply and the risks of tying different credit products together before signing on the cotted line. term. Are you planning to use your home's equity to fund your retirement? How long do you plan on staying in your home? How will you use your HELOC — for renovations, to invest, to consolidate higher interest debt, for emergencies, for a second home, for a vacation? How would interest rate hikes, job loss or illness impact your ability to repay your debt? Would a HELOC tempt you to use your home like an ATM?

HELOC debt is different than other forms of debt. Unlike a credit card or unsecured line of credit, a HELOC is secured by using your home as collateral. While HELOC interest rates are often lower than other forms of credit, they are variable. At any time, banks can demand that you repay your HELOC or increase your interest rate. If you can't pay back the money you owe, you may lose your home or have no choice but to sell it.

Compared to a home equity loan — a lump sum loan with a fixed interest rate, term and repayment schedule — a HELOC works more like a credit card. Your available balance decreases as you borrow and increase as you pay it back, up to a certain credit limit. Some HELOC credit limits increase you pay down your mortgage.

To switch lenders the next time your mortgage is up for renewal, you may first need to repay all credit products tied together under your readvanceable mortgage. And there are additional legal fees you wouldn't incur when moving a traditional mortgage.

Another advantage is that they can ofter their own warranty on their work. Keep a record of exactly what was done in case you ever have a disagreement with your builder about claimed defects.

It's important to remember that the new home warranty only covers the work and materials provided by the builder, so proceed with caution when the urge to renovate strikes.

Wait 10 seconds before redialing. If you're unable to complete a call, this short wait can help reduce network congestion. Remember that cordless phones rely on electricity and will not work during a power outage. So, if you have a landline, keep at least one corded phone in your home.

Stock up your emergency kit. Keep extra batteries or a charger for your mobile device. Consider getting a solarpowered, crank or vehicle phone charger. If you don't have a cell phone, keep a prepaid phone card in your emergency

Listen for updates. The Alert Ready system is designed to deliver critical and potentially life-saving alerts to Canadians through television, radio and now mobile. Keep an eye or ear out for these alerts, which will override regularly scheduled programming and send you text messages in a threat to life situation. Save your safe meeting location. If you have a smartphone, add this spot to its mapping application so you can easily navigate to it in a pinch.

Conserve your battery. Reduce your smartphone's screen's brightness, set it to airplane mode, and close apps you are not using - you never know how long a power outage will last. Know who to call. Remember, in an emergency or to
